### The Life and Career of Deborah K. Rios: Paralegal to Attorney

Rios was born and raised in Corpus Christi, Texas. She has been licensed since 2002. She obtained her associates degree in Legal Assisting from Del Mar College in 1991. She had been working as a paralegal for five years before deciding to return to college and thereafter applying to law school. She graduated with honors from Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi in 1999 with a bachelor's degree in Political Science. She graduated with her juris doctorate from St. Mary's University School of Law in 2002.

She started her professional career working at a civil defense law firm (the people who defend businesses, corporations, and insurance companies). She was there six months when she decided to pursue her dream of opening her own law office. In 2003, she opened the Law Office of Deborah K. Rios, where she primarily practiced family law, probate, wills and estates, and personal injury. In 2005, she was offered a unique opportunity to work as in-house counsel for a physician who had several medical practices. She did that for a couple of years and then returned to private practice, where she expanded her practice to include criminal law. In 2010, she was hired as an Assistant Attorney General in the Child Support Division of the Office of the Attorney General, prosecuting child support enforcement cases as well as paternities and modifications. In the summer of 2012, she returned to private practice, where she narrowed her law practice to focus on criminal and family law. Each different venture has afforded her experience in different areas of laws.

Rios does not regret her decision to switch careers, and she hopes others will consider the job change if it is right for them.

**TODD A. HUNTER** was born in Bartlesville, Oklahoma, on August 26, 1953. He attended the University of Kansas (1971-1975) and Southern Methodist University Dedman School of Law (1975-1978). Hunter has practiced law since November 1978 and is currently a partner of The Law Office of Todd A. Hunter in Corpus Christi. Todd and his wife, Alexis Taylor Hunter, have three children: Todd Jr., Michael, and Christina.

During his previous tenure in the Texas House of Representatives (1989-1997), Todd served on the Civil Practices Committee as its

Chairman, the State Affairs Committee as Vice Chairman, and on the Appropriations Committee as the Chairman of the Education Sub-Committee. He also served as a member of the Ways and Means, Elections, Calendars, Urban Affairs, and Higher Education Committees.

In 2008, Todd returned to the Texas House as the Representative for District 32, which included Aransas, San Patricio, and Calhoun Counties, as well as part of Nueces County for his fifth term.

In the 82nd Legislative Session (his sixth term), Todd was named the Chairman of the Calendars Committee and as Chairman of the Select Committee on Election Contest. He also served on the General Investigating & Ethics, Human Services, and Correction Committees.

In 2012, Todd was elected for his seventh term to a district that encompasses the eastern half of Nueces County. For the 83rd Legislative Session, Todd was once again named Chairman of the Calendars Committee. He was also a member of the Redistricting, Judiciary and Civil Jurisprudence, County Affairs, General Investigating and Ethics, and Transportation Funding Committees.

Todd was elected for his eighth term in 2014. He was appointed the Chairman of the Calendars Committee and Vice-Chairman of the Urban Affairs Committee for the 84th Legislative Session. He was also a member of the Criminal Jurisprudence, Redistricting, and General Investigating and Ethics Committees.

Rep. Hunter was re-elected in 2016 for his ninth term. He was once again appointed the Chairman of the Calendars Committee, Vice Chairman of Criminal Jurisprudence, and a member of the County Affairs Committee.

## **History of Magistrate Judges**

When Congress created the current three-tiered system of courts under Article III of the Constitution in 1896, United States Commissioners could be appointed by district judges to handle preliminary matters in criminal cases, like receiving bonds. In 1940, Congress expanded the duties of Commissioners to include trial of petty criminal offenses by consent. The Federal Magistrates Act of 1968 replaced the Commissioner with a position of Magistrate. In 1990, the title magistrate was changed to magistrate judge.

Magistrate judges are appointed by judges of the district court for a term of eight years. They may dispose of minor criminal offenses and may hold bench or jury trials in civil actions on consent of the parties. In addition, magistrate judges handle preliminary proceedings in felony matters, report and recommend to the district court on dispositive matters in civil cases, act as masters when appointed, and manage and rule on non-dispositive matters in civil cases.

United States*, No. 11-50792 consolidated with No. 12-50217 and No. 12-50301 (5th Cir.). Under pressure of Mr. Hilliard's litigation, as well as condemnation from Congressional leaders and international human rights organizations, the Border Patrol announced sweeping revisions to use-of-force policies and the case caught the attention of the Nation's highest court.

**2017:** After Mr. Hilliard filed a lawsuit against Major League Baseball for a client severely injured by a foul ball, all thirty ball clubs announced they would extend safety netting beyond the dugout.


